From the Desk of Rev. Eric Elnes Ph.D. | Senior Minister

C.S. Lewis once wrote,

If ours is an examined faith, we should be unafraid to doubt. If doubt is eventually justified, we were believing what clearly was not worth believing. But if doubt is answered, our faith has grown stronger. It knows God more certainly and it can enjoy God more deeply.

I believe these words resonate with most Countrysiders. As a congregation, we tend to be quite interested in growing as people of faith. However, we aren't particularly interested in having the kind of faith that Mark Twain envisioned when he claimed, "Faith is believing in stuff you know ain't true."

Faith is not the same as belief. Rather, faith – which is trust in God – is like a three-stranded rope whose strands are:

Belief Doubt Experience

Because this God in whom we are supposed to place our trust is so much greater than we can imagine, our specific **beliefs** about this God are *supposed to* be changing. Constantly changing, in light of fresh revelation and deeper relationship. What causes our outmoded beliefs to change is **doubt** – doubt born of an **experience**, which throws our beliefs into question and causes us to reconfigure them into a higher form.

It's not very complicated. It works like it did with that kid, Mikey, from the Life cereal commercials. You know, the kid who believed that he didn't like Life? What changed Mikey's **belief** was the **experience** of actually trying a bowl of Life, which caused him to question and reformulate his old belief. One would guess that the experience also produced greater faith (trust) in his mother, who had insisted the whole time that he'd like it.

If you desire to grow in faith, you must grow in doubt. Not doubt born of mere cynicism, but the kind of doubt that opens one to experiencing a higher form of faith.

Would you like to give doubt – and faith – a run for their money? Here's a challenge: I challenge you to **envision yourself doing one of two basic things** that you may not already be inclined to do. I'm going to tell you what these two things are in what follows, but will you agree to take up this challenge before knowing what they are? I mean, why not? I'm not asking you to actually **do** either of them, unless you become personally persuaded that you **want to** do them, or at least give one of them a try. So are you in? [Yes - No] Choose one:

Option 1: The first thing I invite you to envision is joining a journey group that is studying Luke during our upcoming series, The Way of

Jesus, which begins Oct 18th. This means a weekly commitment (accounting for holidays and times you simply can't make it) from mid-October until Easter. In this group setting, you can envision experiencing Jesus through the eyes of one of the most fascinating authors of the entire Bible. Luke is especially fascinating because he is the Bible's only Gentile author, which means he has a keen understanding of why Jesus is so important to people like us, who are not Jewish. In this setting, you can also envision getting to know 8-12 people better than you ever have before. They'll let you into their lives and, as you feel comfortable, you'll let them into yours. If you choose this option, you can envision laughing a lot in your group. You can also envision shedding a tear or two. And by Easter, you can envision feeling a lot more connected to God, to Jesus, and to your life's path than you do now.

Will you take the time to prayerfully reflect on joining a Luke group? Remember that I'm only asking you to *envision* doing this. While I hope you will go beyond the challenge and, in fact, join a Luke group, this is not my purpose.

My purpose is to get you to embrace your doubts about joining a Luke group, and by doing so, to **allow God to respond to your doubts**. Tell God:

"God, I *doubt* I have enough time to participate."

"God, I *doubt* that my participation will change my life for the better."

"God, I *doubt* I need to know anything more about you that the Gospel of Luke could supply."

Just keep on naming your doubts. Let God meet you right in the heart of them. Then trust whatever experience you have. Whether your experience leads you toward or away from participation, you will be a stronger person of faith for having expressed your doubts honestly to God. Frankly, not everyone **should** participate in a Luke group. But everyone should at least consider it prayerfully. As C.S. Lewis asserts: "*If doubt is eventually justified, we were believing what clearly was not worth believing. But if doubt is answered, our faith has grown stronger.*"

Option #2: The second option I invite you to prayerfully envision is tithing – giving ten percent of your net income to God. Again remember: I'm only asking you to *envision* it, then do whatever your feel led to do. (Incidentally, in the last several years enough Countrysiders have moved from *envisioning* tithing to *doing* it that perception of a person's wealth is not an accurate indicator of who is among Countryside's top fifty givers.)

If you will take an honest look at your net income and come up with what a true ten-percent tithe would be, and vividly envision giving it to God, this will certainly produce doubt – doubt which I strongly encourage you to express to your Creator:

“God, if I were to do this, I *doubt* that you would keep me from going broke!”

“God, if I were to do this, I *doubt* that you would make me a happier person than I am now.”

“God, I *doubt* that you ever asked for a tithe in the first place no matter what the Bible claims. After all, the Bible claims a lot of things that I don’t believe.”

Admit your doubts. Embrace your doubts! Then, **let God respond to your doubts** in whatever way God will.

As you experience doubt, by the way, you may also experience something else. That “something else” is what has led people of faith for thousands of years to tithe, including my family. Just do the work of honestly envisioning tithing and see what happens.

Whatever your experience leads you to conclude with respect to tithing, you will be a stronger person of faith for having participated in this challenge because you will have honestly posed the question and sincerely sought God’s response. And there’s a bonus: whatever level of giving you and God arrive at, you will experience **zero** guilt over not giving more because you are giving as you feel directed to give.

Okay, those are the two options. Which will you choose to envision? Option #1? Option #2? And yes, it’s perfectly okay to envision both if you really want to. You have nothing to lose and much to gain.

It should be a refreshing time out with friends rather than another obligation in an over-busy schedule. Give me a call and share your doubts with me. I’m not a high-pressure saleswoman – I promise! I welcome you to visit a Journey Group and try it out. As Eric said, “You have nothing to lose and much to gain.”

Oct 22 at 7:00 p.m.—*Heroes, Merlin and the Meaningful Life*—Internationally best-selling children's author T.A. Barron

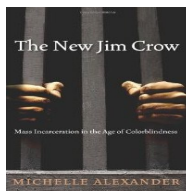

Adult Education Offerings This Fall

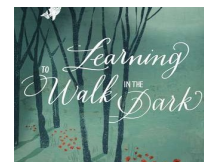

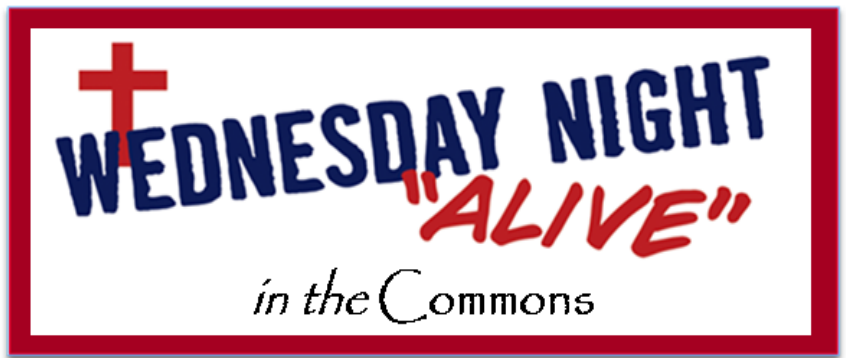
