

I am forced to either shut a window or throw on a sweatshirt and gather a series of makeshift paperweights to stay comfortably put. I love

fall. Especially surrounded by books. Fall reminds me of all the years spent in the educational cycle, in my own experience, as well as raising my children in it. In the education cycle, fall is the beginning of the New Year, not January as the calendar might report, nor April as the budding leaves breaking through into new life might suggest.

In the church calendar, the New Year technically begins with Advent at the end of November, but again, the *life* of the church would suggest otherwise. Fall is when everyone gathers again after sporadic absences throughout the summer visiting family, friends, or far off lands, and the excitement is contagious. The atmosphere is one of hope and pregnant possibilities. Our children return to Kindernook, Sunday School, Wednesday night choirs and fun interactions with friends as they engage the Bible stories together with *Holy Moly* and *Connect*. Our newest members are building new friendships as they engage the *Phoenix Affirmations*, and many of us are returning to our weekly small groups (which we are now calling "journey groups"), while we kick off a new year of Wednesday night suppers, adult choirs and a new ministry gathering time we call "Wednesday Night Alive *In the Commons*."



Every Wednesday, Countryside is opening the coffee bar for specialty drinks and offering light snacks as folks gather to get to know each other a little better. As an icebreaker, we are bringing in speakers to set up a topic of conversation for us. When you are at a loss for what to say to someone who you might not know very well, you can pick up the questions provided at each of the tables, and practice conversation with one another as you share your experiences within these topics. Before you know it, community emerges and is surrounding you at every step!



And this fall, we are kicking off our new lecture series for the Center for Faith Studies, "The Mythic Journey," with Rev. Eric Elnes, Ph.D. This event is Eric's first stop of his book tour presenting his newest book *Gifts of the Dark Wood*. This event is Thursday, September 10, at 7:00pm. with Father Tom Griesen, from the archdiocese of Omaha as a respondant to Eric's presentation. There will be plenty of time for discussion afterward, as well as a celebration for Eric as we send him off with our prayers on his four-week book tour.

The first book I chose to read among the stacks surrounding me on my study leave was Eric's. Have you read it yet? It's a perfect read for those of us who feel the energy of something new coming alongside of us, but have no idea how to name it, or engage it, in our everyday living. Eric has provided us with some terrific language to get us talking to one another and engaging the Spirit who provides the energy that gathers us together in community, encouraging us to share our uncertainties, our emptiness, and our common sense of feeling lost, so that in our discussions we might experience these things as the gifts that transform us to the fullness of life. And isn't this what we are looking for when we come together as church?

Catch the contagious energy and consider trying something new this fall, maybe show up on Wednesday night *In the Commons*, join one of the choirs, attend one of the many great lectures lined up for a Center for Faith Studies, or start a new Journey group discussing *Gifts of the Dark Wood*, along with the Darkwood Brew series by the same name that covers each of the gifts Eric discusses. You never know where you might end up as the Spirit's energy calls you into places you may not go on your own! Welcome to fall! CRC Update Aug. 23, 2015

The CRC received and reviewed a Request for Proposal (RFP) from the architectural firm of Alley Poyner Machietto/HGA. Paul Nelson, chair of the CRC Building and Design committee, gave a presentation on this RFP to the Church Council at their August 20 meeting. Church Council moved to approve the proposal with firm qualifications and execute an AIA B101 - 2007 standard form of agreement between the Owner (Countryside Community Church) and the Architect. The contract will incorporate specifics cited in the proposal which will be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Countryside Community Church uses a fund-based accounting system. At an earlier meeting of the Board of Trustees, approval was given to establish a separate fund and savings account for the relocation project. The Trustees approved at their August 18 meeting, the initial funds necessary during the next 6 months for the relocation project. A comprehensive church budget will be developed and presented at the annual meeting that includes both the church's operational annual budget and the relocation budget for 2016.

The CRC will be putting together building subcommittees utilizing volunteers who served on committees during the visioning process, as well as those who have volunteered recently. Watch for further communications for opportunities to become involved.

The CRC is actively working on plans for project budgets, project timelines, capital campaign and communication strategies. Vice Chair, Tim Kerrigan and Project Advocates (Countryside's owners representative) presented a preliminary budget for planning, construction and relocation purposes. The cost assumptions followed the guidelines arrived at during the visioning process back in January 2015. This budget is very preliminary and will change as we get further into the design process. It will also be impacted by the capital campaign. The CRC will notify the congregation as information is available.

What we recycled from the Tri-Faith Picnic:

- 1. Utensils: 12 lbs
- 2. Solo cups: 11 lbs
- 3. Other plastic (food containers, etc.): 4 lbs
- 4. Paper napkins: 7 lbs. (this was composted and not recycled. My family's garden thanks you).
- 5. Total: 34 lbs of waste that was not put in a landfill today, but reused.

Financial Cost Savings: we saved the City of Omaha \$0.90, \$0.53 in recycling revenue and \$0.37 in landfill avoidance charges. Prices are from the wasteline website: http://www.wasteline.org/cont_pri.htm I'm assuming Countryside's waste charges are fixed, but I don't honestly know. A potential cost savings to the church long term for regular meals (i.e. Wednesday nights). This also gives you an idea of how cheap our landfill costs are in NE: \$21.79/ton. U.S. average is \$49.78/ton in 2013.

Environmental Impact: I made some assumptions here as the utensils and solos cups didn't have a breakdown of materials (i.e. how much polystyrene is in one cup versus other plastics, fillers, glues, etc.). Secondly, since solo cups and the utensils are mostly polystyrene and polystyrene is non-biodegradable, the landfill CO2 emissions for polystyrene is actually low. Global Warming Potential numbers and decomposition numbers are guessimates and will vary landfill to landfill, so there is some error here. Assume paper napkins have 40% carbon wet weight.

Recycling the solo cups and utensils (23 lbs). Assuming 67% of product is actually polystyrene (15.4 lbs) and assuming 50% of that actually gets reused (7.7 lbs), then we saved 26.6 lbs of new CO2 emissions to make new #6 plastic instead of using recycled polystyrene.

Recycling the 4 lbs of "other" plastic. Assuming 67% of product is actually recyclable plastic (2.68 lbs) and assuming 50% of that actually gets reused (1.34 lbs), then we saved 0.89 lbs methane emissions (CH4) with a GWP of 22.25 (assuming the landfill doesn't collect the methane) lbs of CO2 emissions and 4.02 lbs of CO2 emission from the plastics, a total savings of 26.27 lbs of new CO2 emissions to make new plastic instead of using the recycled plastic.

Composting the 7 lbs of paper napkins prevented 1.9 lbs of methane and 5.1 lbs of carbon from being released into the atmosphere, a total GWP of 51.8 lbs of CO2 that would have gone to the atmosphere if that paper was thrown away and ended in a landfill.

Myth. Story. For some, these words are negative – to be equated with delusional, fanciful thinking or, even worse – outright deception. However, for those who have found sanctuary in libraries and book stores and never tire of seeing a compelling movie over and over again, powerful myths and stories are important vehicles for apprehending a truth deeper and richer than simple facts can possibly portray.

What do myths and stories tell us about ourselves, the world we live in, and the ways in which we should respond to crises and challenges that arise in our lives? Is there value in imagining ourselves as the heroes and heroines of the great stories when

facing our own personal dragons, enchanted forests, and descents into darkness? Myths can inspire us to choose paths that serve life, beauty and hope, to do our part to save the world.


