MOVING WORSHIP ONLINE

It was so routine for Eric Elnes. He has been pastor at Countryside for 12 years. Wednesday mornings were worship planning where the services were planned for approximately two weeks out. On Fridays, Eric worked on his sermon for Sunday and then on Sunday mornings, changes could be made all the way up until it was time to start the service.

That has all changed for the time being. Worship planning has been moved to Monday afternoons, to accommodate new deadlines. Services now have to be planned out even farther. A completed worship service has a deadline of Friday afternoon to be ready to go for KMTV Channel 3. "For every minute you see on screen," Eric explained, "there can be hours of work. For example, the bathroom scene I shot for the April 19 service was about a minute. But it took five hours and 21 takes to make that scene. It takes a lot of extra work to make it look effortless."

Eric works together with Ben Semisch, our church photographer and videographer, Alex Ritter, Artistic Director/Organist and on Sunday mornings, Steve Hess, A/V Coordinator. He also works with Rebecca Morello, who provides a weekly Children's Moment, and Chris Alexander, who contributes a Pastoral Prayer and recently has been hosting the "Question of the Week." Eric is the director and film editor for most of what you see on Sundays. He spends hours upon hours stitching video clips together and cleaning up the sound. "The extra work is worth it to me," says Eric. "A lot of people are hurting right now and really miss the experience of being together on Sunday

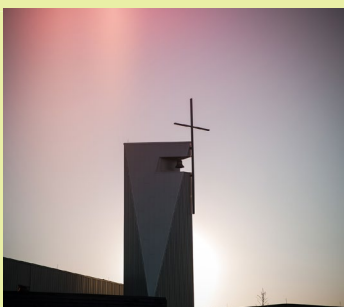
mornings. I figure the least we can do as staff is provide the congregation with the highest quality alternative we possibly can. If it takes some late nights in my makeshift editing bay, so be it."

Speaking in front of a camera instead of a church filled with people poses a challenge for many ministers, but Eric makes it seem natural. "I have always treated every Sunday as if the main person I need to be addressing in the congregation is Jesus," Eric said. "This has helped me because, even now, I just basically talk to Jesus, only now Jesus is looking and listening through the camera in front of me. Eric also attributes his ability to speak naturally in front of the camera to the five years he spent hosting Darkwood Brew - Countryside's online television program. He does miss strongly the human connections, and the energy he feels speaking in front of the members of Countryside on Sundays. "It's an intuitive energy I feel, not just by looking at the faces, but through all of us gathered together," he explained. "Now, if I quiet myself, I can still feel the energy of Countryside on Sunday mornings. It's just more subtle."

There is one huge benefit to all of this change for Eric. "I now get to spend Sunday mornings, with my wife Melanie, and worship. Something I haven't been able to do for a very long time." He also used to take Mondays off but with his new shooting schedule he takes Saturdays off. "I almost get a full weekend for the first time in my 25-year ministry!" he said. That is, unless he is having to make video edits for the online Countryside service.

PUBLIC WORSHIP WILL REMAIN ONLINE THROUGH MAY

Governor Ricketts recently announced plans to move forward to open parts of the state, including places of worship. The moderators and staff of Countryside Community Church have been working with medical experts in our congregation to decide what is best for moving forward. (See page 2 for a model being considered based on CDC guidelines). Wanting to err on the side of the health and safety of the congregation, a decision has been made to not resume public worship in May and into June. While the church remains closed, we will continue to monitor the situation and provide alternative worship experiences and ways of connection. We are currently broadcasting our Sunday worship via the church's website (Livestream or YouTube) at 10 AM and KMTV Channel 3 at 11 AM. The health and safety of our church members and staff is our top priority as we make our way, together, through these uncertain times. Our staff and Church Council will reassess the situation at the June 18 Council meeting. Until then, please continue to worship together on one of our many platforms and stay safe.

FOUR-PHASE CHURCH RESTART PLAN BEING CONSIDERED

The Iowa, Nebraska & South Dakota Conferences of the United Church of Christ (Tri-Conference) have asked churches in our conferences to refrain from gathering in person through the month of May and possibly June so we may continue to protect and care for one another. The health and safety of our church members, staff and neighbors will always be our top priority as we make our way through these uncertain times. Worship services will remain online in May. Bobbie Escolas and her husband started coming to Countryside when the church first moved to the Tri-Faith Commons and she officially became a member of Countryside last June. "I was really attracted to the Tri-Faith aspect and the environmental focus of Countryside," Bobbie said. "I even got my husband to start coming with me. It took some time but now he loves it and so do I!" One of the reasons Bobbie loves coming to Countryside is she says, "It gives you the space to be who you are and you are part of a community." She was overjoyed to find a church and was finding and making new friends and discovering where in the church she wanted to work and volunteer. She was in the middle of barista training when everything shut down.

Everything through Countryside was quickly going online: Worship service (which have luckily always been live-streamed) book clubs, small groups, coffee meet ups and even Countryside's various board meetings. Bobbie asked herself, "What do I need to learn now? I need to pay attention to how God is revealing herself to me," she said. "There are always ways to learn and grow, but I do struggle with Zoom a little bit!"

She started watching Sunday service online with her husband, Ed, but was delighted when it started airing on KMTV. She lives on an acreage and her broadband width is not that great. She really loves the music in the services.

Bobbie has also been able to attend the Zoom coffees with Diane Scott and is working to attend the Board of Christian Outreach as well as the Tri-Faith Board as a Countryside representative. She has looked for a silver lining in all of this as well, thinking about what she has learned and how it will help Countryside when it physically opens up again. "Meeting on Zoom and figuring out all this digital stuff might really help people in our church who can't drive at night, or get sick or are traveling. They will be able to stay in touch during those times," she continued, "Out of the bad, good things happen."

When we someday get the all clear, Bobbie wants to hang out with her family then jump in the motor home with Ed and head on a trip to Glacier National Park.

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CONNECT CALLERS GOING STRONG

Countryside has 58 people who have volunteered to be CONNECT Callers. They have all been busy dialing the phone and sending emails out to other Countryside members, to help ensure that each member of our community has been checked in on and knows Countryside members, staff and pastors are here for them. The church was divided into two groups to make the list more manageable. It was decided that anyone who was already active in a small group or board would be contacted by someone from that group. Then the rest of the families in the church were divided up among the CONNECT Callers.

Leslie Summers is one our Countryside CONNECT Callers. "I wanted to be of service," said Leslie. "It was one thing I knew I could do - pick up the phone and reach out to people."

"During the first round after I received my list, I started calling and mostly got people's voice mails," Leslie said. "I then emailed everyone and told them I would be calling. The second round of calls, more people answered their phones. People were very receptive to hearing from Countryside. Everyone in my call group seems to be doing well. I have made four to five contacts with each person, using both emails and phone calls. During this time, I also received phone calls and emails from Roxanne in my Stephen Ministries class, so while I was making calls to check in on people, it was nice to know someone was checking in on me."

Jan Brown, Diane Scott and Chris Alexander have been the organizers behind this huge undertaking. They worked on everything from finding all the volunteers, developing an initial script for volunteers to follow, keeping track of those who need extra services and getting people in touch with groups from our church or other agencies that can help. "I volunteered to be a CONNECT Caller because I wanted to help and thought this was a good way for me to offer a familiar voice and to be helpful to Countryside members," Leslie said. STAFF SPOTLIGHT - CHRIS ALEXANDER

Chris Alexander's busy days have not stopped since the orders to physically shut down the church came, but the way she does things has. "I still have at least three to four meetings a day," Chris explained, "but now I Zoom into them so the commute time has actually been nice." Chris spends much of her day meeting with staff, various committees and boards, executive team meetings, and Tri-Faith clergy; you name, it she is probably at that meeting. "Even if it's just for a few minutes, I like to Zoom into some of the small group meetings just to see how things are going," she said.

She is busy working on budgets, talking to people in our community to get them the services they need, building relationships with the ecumenical community and like the rest of us, trying to figure out ways to change events to make them more appropriate for the social distancing that we are dealing with. Chris is also the director of Center for Faith Studies and has been trying to plan what the next year is going to look like for CFS. "One of the hardest things I am dealing with is how to schedule events and speakers. I have to figure out the way we are going to move forward - or is there something else I can do to bring these people to the community without having people sit in large groups in a church?"

Chris has been working with families of our congregation who have been in the hospital or rehabilitation centers. "We have had to find ways to support those who are in places we can't visit. The best way, for now, is to support their families so they, in turn, can support their loved one."

Chris noted there are still so many things going on through the church. "Meals on Wheels is still running, card showers have been created to help support our members in the hospital, the small groups take care of each, other doing things like picking up groceries and running errands for those who can't." She also said just about every small group and adult education group is still meeting using Zoom.

She was looking forward to doing some continuing education in San Diego this May. Although she is disappointed that this will not be happening, she sti has faith that her daughter's wedding will still be happening in October. "No matter what, that is happening," Chris said. "We will make adjustments as we need to, but we are definitely still having that wedding!"

When this is all over, Chris would really like to take a trip to Ireland with her husband.

THE BOX FOR MAY

Youth Emergency Services (YES) is exactly what the name alludes to. It is located at 26th and Farnam and serves as an emergency shelter for youth ages 16-20. It is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Not only do they shelter and feed clients but they also provide a trained staff of counselors and advocates to help residents work through the problems they face. They offer specialized case management services and transitional living programs as well as a variety of other programs to assist clients with a positive and successful road ahead. HOPE: A PESSIMIST'S GUIDE - A WORSHIP SERIES, A BIBLE STUDY, AND A BOOK STUDY, APRIL 19-JUNE 7

Worship Series: Easter is about HOPE. A Global Pandemic fosters DOUBT. What happens when HOPE and DOUBT have a conversation? You get a new worship series and congregational Bible study called "Hope: A Pessimist's Guide"! If the name sounds familiar, Countryside originally produced this series in 2011, only we're totally updating it to allow it to speak powerfully to our day.

Bible Study: Concurrent with our worship series, you are invited to participate in, or lead, a small group Bible study! We'll be using video resources produced by Darkwood Brew, which are available at www.darkwoodbrew.org. Dr. Elnes will lead one of these studies online. Others will be led by small group leaders (perhaps you?) who will be trained in how to use Zoom or Facebook to stream the video to their group, accompanied by lively conversation. No biblical or theological experience is necessary. Pause points and suggested questions are all provided! All you need to do is hit Play and Pause to lead an invigorating conversation about finding hope in troubled times.

Darkwood Brew videos feature exclusive interviews with acclaimed author, Scott Russell Sanders, whose book, *Hunting for Hope*, inspired this series. Dr. Elnes taped these interviews in Sanders's home in Bloomington, Indiana. Other Darkwood Brew guests include Richard Foster, Phyllis Tickle, Carrie Newcomer and Bob Ravenscroft. Contact Rev. 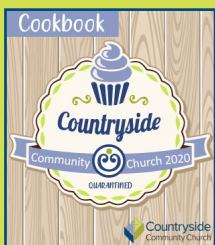

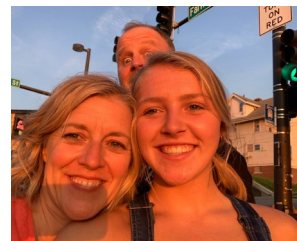

OMAHA GIVES!

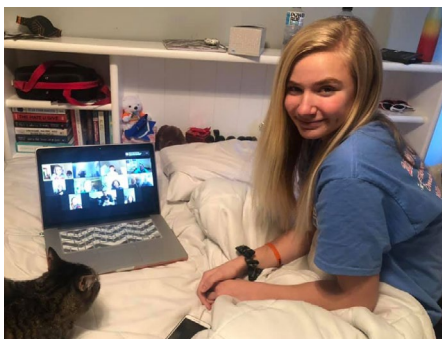

The benefits don't end when the trip is over.

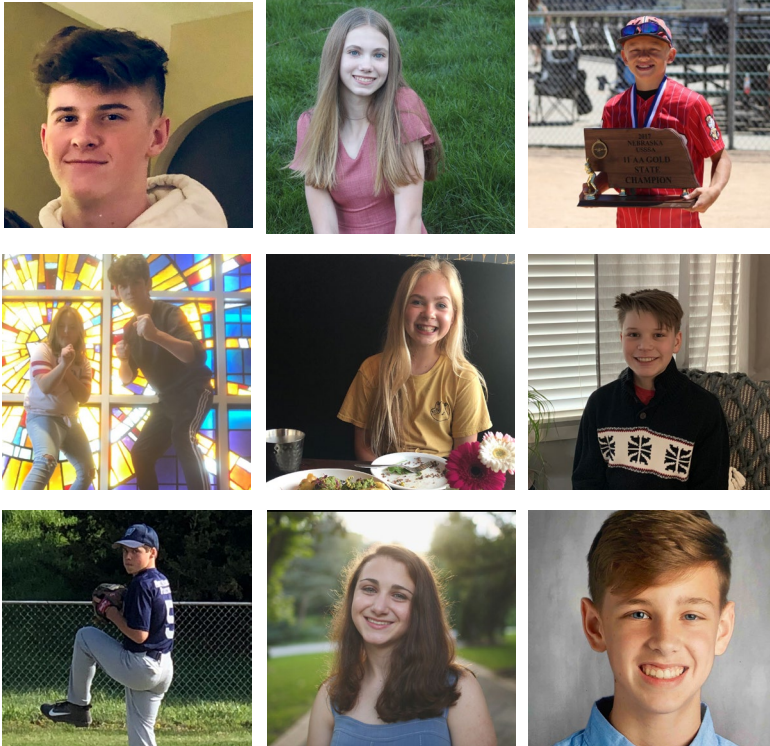
After the experience is over and you're brimming with passion and stories, it doesn't have to end. Continue to focus on seeking justice in your own neighborhood. Keep trying new things.
