Last year during Covid, I was able to work remotely from wherever we were - Omaha, the Sandhills, or Arizona. But recently I've been able to finally go on personal visits again to see many of you; I believe that this job needs to be inhabited by a person who can continue to make personal visits to your homes, hospitals, care facilities, and special groups such as Lunch Bunch. I do feel great sadness in leaving this work -- because your love, tenderness and trust have brought much meaning to my life. I've been and will remain deeply grateful for our many treasured friendships and connections.



I ponder this often: what's the magic potion in this job? Why is it both exhausting and fulfilling? Because both descriptors are true. So I've settled on this: I may have been your Pastoral Care Coordinator, but it's always been a reciprocal relationship. Whatever compassion, humor, wisdom and care I was able to share has been multiplied by your responses and actions toward me. I'm especially thinking of that one hard year, 2019 - when we moved to the Tri-Faith Campus while I was undergoing radiation for breast cancer. Your love, prayers and gestures of kindness at that time are but one example. The caregiver receives so much more than she ever expects.

That reciprocity of love is the magic, isn't it? It's our light at Countryside and as Christians together on this earth. To love one another is both our mission and fuel. We surrender to this love and we are blessed, just as I've been blessed in this sacred work with you, Countryside. Thank you for trusting me! My prayers for our journey continue. *Love, Jan*

WORSHIP

The next sermon series will be focusing on two of our discernment questions

**How do we want to be challenged spiritually and intellectually?
What is our call to serve?**

Starting on September 12, we will be following subjects to learn about the United Church of Christ under their Justice & Local Ministries information. Justice & Local Church Ministries of the United Church of Christ supports congregations and other settings of the church in doing justice, seeking peace, and building vibrant faith communities that are welcoming to all. The ministries and services of Justice and Local Church Ministries are central to the identity of the United Church of Christ.

Specifically we will be focusing on:

Racial Justice (anti-racism) - We are one of the very few Christian churches that are leading bold and courageous conversations, engaging in direct social activism, and participating in civil disobedience as a way to bring attention to and disrupt racist systems and structures. The reality of racism, white supremacy and nationalism threatens God's sacred human family. As people of faith we remain vigilant anti-racist advocates and activists responding to threats and acts of violence towards our sisters and brothers—our siblings of African, Asian, Latin, and Native descent—whose civil and human rights are violated on a daily basis.

Immigration - The United Church of Christ has a long history of solidarity in the struggle for dignity and human rights for immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees regardless of their immigration status. We do this through a network of grassroots leaders in the UCC National Collaborative on Immigration working to share a prophetic stance and lift up the voices of impacted leaders.

Mental Health (WISE - Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged)

- The United Church of Christ Mental Health Network works to reduce stigma and promote the inclusion of people with mental illnesses/brain disorders and their families in the life, leadership and work of congregations. We envision a future in which people with mental illnesses feel welcomed, supported, valued and included in their congregations.

LGBTQIA (ONA - Open And Affirming) - Open and Affirming is a journey of building inclusive churches and other ministry settings that welcome the full participation of LGBTQIA people in the UCC's life and ministry.

Creation Justice (Climate Change) - As one of the UCC's eight Just World Covenant programs, Creation Justice Churches guide congregations in discerning how they can best embody a commitment to care for God's creation.

Disability (A2A - Accessibility to All) The Preamble to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ states that the UCC was formed "in order to express more fully the oneness in Christ of the churches composing it, to make more effective their common witness in Him, and to serve His kingdom in the world." We live in an increasingly complex world, and the complexities of this world include the reality that one in five persons lives with a disability and one in four persons experiences a mental health concern over a lifetime. In John 13:34 (NRSV), Jesus declares: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Within the UCC we can find new ways of loving one another when we expand our hearts, minds, and actions to encompass "Any Body, Every Body, Christ's Body."

THE BOX FOR SEPTEMBER

The Board of Christian Outreach has turned the Box over to Countryside Youth for the next two months and their first choice is Hearts United for Animals located in Auburn, Nebraska. Hearts United for Animals is a Smithsonian Award winning, state-of-the-art no-kill shelter and sanctuary dedicated to the relief of animal suffering. HUA has rescued over 10,000 dogs from puppy mills, has provided low cost spay/neuter services for over 13,000 patients, provides temporary housing for animals of families fleeing domestic violence, places dogs and cats in wonderful new homes across the country through our JetSet Dogs program, and assists with veterinary expenses of animals in need when their owners have nowhere else to turn.

We will be collecting paper towels, trash bags, blankets, towels, adjustable collars, leashes, hard chew toys (not rawhide), cat litter, liquid laundry soap, bleach, cat toys, dog toys and dog and cat treats. The kids have also requested gift certificate donations to Walmart and PetSmart so they can do some shopping for the animals. We will also have the Amazon list online under countrysideucc.org/give. This time will be a little bit different, as the donations will go directly to Hearts United for Animals instead of making a stop at Countryside first. CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE

Council will meet twice a month for the foreseeable future as we navigate through these challenging times. All meetings will begin at 6:30 PM and the upcoming meeting dates are September 2 and September 23. All members of the congregation are welcome to attend.

ACCESS CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

1. Type this address in your computer's browser and then press Enter.
countrysideucc.tpsdb.com
 2. **If you already have a password and can access your record in TouchPoint**, proceed to number 4 below.
 3. **If you are new to TouchPoint**, on the opening page there will be a **Need an Account? Request Password** link. After clicking the link, you will be asked to enter the email address that is on your member record in TouchPoint.
 - If the system finds a record with an email address that matches the one you entered, you will be sent an email with your username and a one-use link. The link will take you to a page where you will create a password. Once that is done, you will be instructed to proceed to your record by clicking the logo.
 - If you did NOT receive an email as described above, that means one of the following:
 - There is not a record in the database with the email address you provided.
 - Your record does not have your date of birth on file. You will need to contact the church office to have your date of birth added to your record.
 - You are younger than 16 years old and are not permitted to set up your own account.
 4. **When your record in TouchPoint opens**, you will see the following headings on a horizontal row of tabs under your name and address:
 - Personal
 - Involvement
 - Profile
 - Ministry
 - Giving
 - Communications
 - Resources
 - System
 5. **To access Church Council minutes**, click on the Resources tab. The minutes are in order by date, oldest to newest. Scroll to the minutes you would like to see and click on the smaller print version of the title. The minutes will be downloaded onto your computer – click the title of the minutes in the lower left corner of your screen to open the document.

COVID-19 TASK FORCE UPDATE

The task force recommended that the church discard the original red, pink, orange, yellow, green COVID response system that was originally designed before vaccines were available. The task force recommended the following guidelines which the Church Council approved at its August 19 meeting:

- Masks are required for worship on Sundays, funerals, weddings, and while moving around in the building at all times.
- Masks may be removed while in your own office space.
- Put on a mask if someone comes in to your office space.
- Masks are required for all church group meetings.
- Strongly encourage outside groups to wear masks if unable to socially distance.
- Move promptly to outside areas immediately from the sanctuary following worship to visit.

Masks are required for all events with children present.

As many of you know, a third dose of mRNA vaccines is now recommended for immunocompromised individuals (eg, solid organ transplant recipients, other similarly immunosuppressed individuals).

Pending vaccine decisions include full approval for the Pfizer vaccine (likely within the next few weeks) and a third dose for immunocompetent individuals beginning with nursing homes and health care providers (possibly starting in September).



A TIME FOR DISCERNMENT

As we begin to move forward and look for settled ministers, three questions have been formulated by the Church Council to help us begin the discernment process:

1. How do we want to be challenged spiritually and intellectually.
2. What is our call to serve?
3. What does it mean to be the Christian partner of the Tri-Faith Initiative?

To get the conversations started, we will be offering:

Small group meetings which will take place in homes, on Zoom and at the church. They will be made up of 6-12 church members who, together, will meet and talk about their hopes and prayers for Countryside as well as answer the three questions (above).

Learning/listening sessions are another

component of our discernment process.

These will be opportunities to learn about the United Church of Christ, our leadership model and more about the United Church of Christ search and call process.

Congregational information meetings will be used as another opportunity to get involved and also to provide feedback from the small groups. Here is where you will receive updates and share in the search and call process for settled ministers

Lastly, we will provide **feedback opportunities** to respond to the output of our small groups and to allow for the most common themes to come to the surface.

PREPARING YOURSELF FOR DISCERNMENT

There's something to be said for spontaneity. On the other hand, some of our choices in life require deep thought, prayer, and consideration, lest we find ourselves facing the consequences of a poor decision. That's where the art of discernment comes in. Discernment is a time-honored practice in the Christian tradition. In essence, discernment is a decision-making process that honors the place of God's will in our lives. It is an interior search that seeks to align our own will with the will of God in order to learn what God is calling us to. Every choice we make, no matter how small, is an opportunity to align ourselves with God's will.

Be Aware of Yourself

- **Find Some Solitude.** It's good to talk to other people when making important decisions, but at some point, it is crucial to make some time to be alone with your thoughts and with God. Invite God into your decision-making process.
- **Take the Time to Get to Know Yourself.** Make an honest self-assessment of your faith life. How regularly do you pray and attend worship services? What is your level of involvement in service to Countryside and its community? What kind of leadership do you respond to? How much structure do you need in your life? Reflect on how you view others.
- **Accept Yourself as You Are.** As you get to know yourself, accept what you find. Remember that no matter how you might find yourself, God created you and loves you.

Be in Touch with God

- **Let God Speak to You.** Most of us don't actually hear a voice when God speaks to us. However, pay attention closely to the ways that God is speaking to you. What kind of thoughts, feelings (especially love, joy, and peace, or a lack thereof), and memories might God be stirring within you to help you make your decision? What Scripture story comes to mind that might enlighten your decision? Find the passage or story and prayerfully read it. Pray to the Holy Spirit to guide you as you randomly open your Bible. You'll be surprised with the messages you may receive.
- **Develop a Practice of Prayer.** No relationship develops between persons unless they listen to each other. You must learn to listen to God in prayer and not merely ask Him to listen to you. Experiment with various forms of prayer until you find those which help you feel connected.
- **Pray to Do God's Will.** As difficult as it may be, pray the words "thy will be done," asking God to give you the strength you need to discern his will and to follow it. Involvement in the church not only brings us closer to God, it brings us closer to the church community. Sharing important beliefs and values with others in your community is a precious gift.

Lastly, you are invited to approach discernment prayerfully, letting go of any barriers to being totally receptive to the Holy Spirit's leading. Practice the grace to lay aside ego, preconceived notions, biases, and predetermined conclusions that may limit openness to God in order to reach "holy indifference." Holy indifference means being indifferent to all but God's will. It does not mean, "I don't care." While we do not abandon our values and convictions, we are called to be open and focused above all on what God desires for this particular time and matter. "Holy indifference" challenges us to wrestle with the question, "Are we willing to let something die to give God room for something new?"
