Music notes:

Chant is a musical foundation that ties the three Abrahamic faiths, and many global religions, together. All modern music can trace origins to chant in one way or another. *Veni Creator Spiritus* is a Gregorian chant that dates back to the ninth century, and is used to this day in the Catholic and some protestant churches as an invocation to the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. The Spirit is often referred to as wind, fire, a dove, etc., and the chant is accompanied by handbells mimicking windchimes to reference the presence of the Spirit characterized by wind.

Come, Holy Spirit, our souls inspire and lighten with celestial fire; Thy blessed unction from above is comfort, life, and fire of love;

Pentecost is a festival holiday in the liturgical calendar, and poet Fred Pratt Green penned When In Our Music, God is Glorified as a hymn for a "festival of praise." The text is groundbreaking in that it explores music as a sacrament – a way in which the Holy Spirit can "move us to a more profound Alleluia," and intentionally resembles a hymn that the disciples sung at the Last Supper – tying music into that sacrament as well. The Holy Spirit as a concept is pretty complex, and there is plenty of theological debate about what it is and is not. Come to us, Creative Spirit, written by Anglican clergyman David Mowbray, portrays the way in which the movement of the Spirit can work within a congregation and the world, using the arts as a lens through which we can think about the Spirit to make the concept less impenetrable.

Come to us, creative Spirit, in this holy house; ev'ry human talent hallow, hidden skills arouse, that within your earthly temple, wise and simple may rejoice. Poet, painter, music-maker, all your treasures bring; craftsman, actor, graceful dancer, make your offering; join your hands in celebration: let creation shout and sing! Word from God eternal springing, fill our minds, we pray; and in all artistic vision give integrity: may the flame within us burning kindle yearning day by day. In all places and forever glory be expressed to the Son, with God the Maker and the Spirit blest: in our worship and our living keep us striving for the best.

How Like A Gentle Spirit was written by C. Eric Lincoln, a Methodist minister and Christian ethicist who was an important scholar in the field of sociology of religion who taught at many of the most important universities and seminaries. He wrote extensively on race and religion, particularly the Black Muslim movement (he was the first academic to publish scholarly research on the Nation of Islam), and was friends with MLK and Malcolm X. His scholarship and experiences helped shape this hymn, which he wrote to express "the uniqueness and universality of the Divine Being as it should be expressed in worship."
