

SECOND LESSON: Matthew 21:1-11

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet:

"Tell the daughter of Zion,
Look, your king is coming to you,
humble and mounted on a donkey,
and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."


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All Glory, Laud, and Honor

Hosanna, Loud Hosanna



Music notes:

All Glory Laud and Honor is the quintessential Palm Sunday hymn, dating back to the ninth century, with text that follows Christ's entry into Jerusalem. It includes a reference to children that doesn't exist in the story, but comes later in the same chapter of Matthew (21) where Christ goes to the temple:

Jesus entered the temple courts and drove out all who were buying and selling there. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the benches of those selling doves. "It is written," he said to them, "'My house will be called a house of prayer,' but you are making it 'a den of robbers."' The blind and the lame came to him at the temple, and he healed them. But when the chief priests and the teachers of the law saw the wonderful things he did and the children shouting in the temple courts, "Hosanna to the Son of David," they were indignant. *(continued on next page)*

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"Do you hear what these children are saying?" they asked him. "Yes," replied Jesus, "have you never read, "From the lips of children and infants you, Lord, have called forth your praise"?"

Solus ad Victimam translates to "the only victim." This anthem is a poignant and powerful setting that depicts Christ's journey to the cross to die alone while foreshadowing Easter and the Resurrection. Both the choir and the accompaniment engage in musical text painting – most notably the organ conveying laughter at the end of the piece as the choir sings "heavy with weeping may the three days pass, to win the laughter of thine Easter Day." It has a history of been banned by committees in some traditional church settings –

not because they want to avoid the concept of penal substitutionary atonement in the text, but because the anthem is dissonant and modern. One choirmaster in Scotland facing a ban as recently as 2019 wrote in response:

"Solus," with Helen Wadell's excellent translation of a text by twelfth-century Peter Abelard, is a fine work too, with art AND craft displayed in almost every bar, from the slow, relentless tread of its introduction ("Alone to sacrifice Thou goest, Lord") to the brilliant blaze of E major at the end. On Passion Sunday, we think of Christ's inexorable journey to death – His being nailed to a cross, and left for 9 hours to die of shock, loss of blood and dehydration under the relentless glare of the Palestinian sun. Not nice. And the music of 'Solus ad victimam' reflects that. The Christian faith, surely, is not just a matter of 'comfort,' but is something too to challenge us, make us (sometimes) UN-comfortable, make us think; and if, on Passion Sunday, a 'gritty' anthem helps us do that then all well and good, and the music will have served its purpose very well."

Jeanette Threlfall (1821-1880) wrote *Hosanna, Loud Hosanna,* depicting the story of children in the Temple shouting Hosanna, and serving as a reminder that Christ welcomed and blessed children throughout his ministry. Threlfall was disabled due to two accidents, the last of which left her confined to her bed. She lived a long life despite her medical challenges, and had a vast output of poetry and hymns. This hymn centers children in the context of ministry, and reflects Threfall's contextualization of a number of Matthew texts leading up to the passion that remind us of the importance of children in our shared ministry.
